Rakujyuen

Rakujyuen is a park with abundant nature approximately 75,474 square meters in size located immediately south of Mishima Station.

The building was constructed in 1890 as a country village for Prince Komatsu Akihito, who played an active part in the Meiji Restoration. The City of Mishima took over the administration of the estate and turned it into a municipal park on July 15, 1952.

Although the natural spring water is showing a tendency to decrease in recent years, the natural springs that feed the Kohama Pond and the Serino Shallows, etc., and the parklands surrounded with natural forests have been designated as a Natural Monument and Place of Scenic Beauty by the government.

The park contains many places to view trees that have grown out of the top of rocks formed by the lava flowing from Mt. Fuji during an eruption ten-thousand years ago (Mishima Lava Flow), and wild birds.

The park also plays host to an Animal Park stocked with lesser pandas, alpacas, capybaras and ponies, etc., a Ride Plaza, the Local Archives Museum, the Rakuivuen, which has been designated as a cultural asset by both the prefecture and the city, and the Sakura and Momiji rest points.

Rakujyukan



Rakujyukan is a sukiya-built house raised above the ground on stilts in the Kyoto style. It was designated as a cultural asset by the City of Mishima on November 20, 1974, and the paintings that decorate the inside of the building painted by Japanese artists representative of the Meiji Era, including six imperial household artists (currently known as living national treasures), such as Yukoku Noguchi and Katei Taki, were designated as cultural assets by Shizuoka Prefecture on November 28, 1980.

Guided visits of the building are available six times per day.

(Unquided tours of the building are not permitted.)

Gather at the entrance to the building before the starting time of the tour.

Tour Starting Time 9:30/10:30/11:30/13:30/14:30/15:30

* Entering and leaving the building midway through the tours, people with infants, and people who have been drinking alcohol are not permitted to enter the building.

* Photography prohibited inside the building.

Kohama Pond

Designated as a Natural Monument and Place of Scenic Beauty. The volume of natural spring water that flows between the lava rocks fluctuates on a daily basis, and recently there are long periods when it is empty. The most recent time that it was full





Arriving by Car

After leaving the Tomei Numazu IC, drive toward Route No.1 (in the direction of Mishima and Hakone) → turn left at the Mishima Tamagawa intersection → drive straight → turn left at the intersection in front of Mishima Station → drive past the Rakuiyuen park entrance in front of Station and then turn left at the corner of the Shimizu Bank → Rakujyuen parking lot * The parking lot for buses is at the Rakujyuen park entrance in front of Station. Note that the parking lot cannot be used for detours, etc.


